

Dear friends,

I invite you to read about our activities in 2024. In these times of exploding Antisemitism and of growing hate for the "other", our work is critical. So instead of celebrating our 10th anniversary with a party, we intensified our work teaching the past with empathy and in meaningful dialogue.

Art has the power to enlighten, uplift, and help people recognize our common humanity even when confronted by inhumanity. We were inspired by the artwork created by people who were persecuted for their identity or for their art by the German National Socialists and their European Allies 1933-1945. Learning about the strength and resilience of the artists and the moral and ethic values of those, who refused to

be perpetrators or bystanders, helps guide our reflections and actions today.

We came together for 4 in-person events and 20 online events in our lecture series "Flight or Fight. stories of artists under repression." Thanks to collaborations with our international network of scholars, institutions and organizations we were able to bring brand new research and a wide range of programs to our audience to discover, learn and discuss. Questions, thoughts and comments were also shared on our social media platforms, including YouTube, Facebook, Instagram, and x.

We published two books and organized the exhibition "Love and Betrayal – The Expressionist Fritz Ascher from New York Private Collections" at Haus der Graphischen Sammlung in Freiburg (Germany). The exhibition was seen by a record number of visitors, and the catalogue publishes much new research and is just beautiful. Thank you, Jutta Götzmann, for a fabulous collaboration

MISSION

The Fritz Ascher Society for Persecuted, Ostracized and Banned Art tells untold stories of artists marginalized and persecuted by the German Nazi regime between 1933 and 1945. By discussing, exhibiting and publishing their work, we commemorate their lives and artistic achievements and teach about the Holocaust. FAS furthers the understanding of the history of the 20th century and initiates an active dialogue about individuality and integrity in response to conditions of extreme duress and to political tyranny.

VISION

The Fritz Ascher Society for Persecuted, Ostracized and Banned Art enriches the understanding of the history of the 20th century by introducing untold stories of artists persecuted for their personal or communal identity by the German Nazi regime. EXHIBITION

Love and Betrayal - The Expressionist Fritz Ascher from New York Private Collections

Haus der Graphischen Sammlung, Freiburg im Breisgau (Germany), November 8, 2024 – March 2, 2025

The late Expressionist artist Fritz Ascher (1893-1970) survived two world wars and persecution by the National Socialist regime.

Thanks to a cooperation between the Fritz Ascher Society for Persecuted, Ostracized and Banned Art, New York, the Augustinermuseum and the Museum für Neue Kunst, the Haus der Graphischen Sammlung in Freiburg presented his early work for the first time in a concentrated selection of graphic works from November 8, 2024 to March 2, 2025. These included charcoal, graphite and ink drawings, as well as brightly colored gouache.

Mythological and literary, historical, and biblical themes demonstrate the breadth of Ascher's interests. He was always a keen observer of his time. Since 1916, he has explored the themes of love and betrayal in intimate drawings. The primal catastrophe of the First World War and the revolutionary unrest in Berlin led him to Christian-spiritual themes, which he radically reinterpreted. With his unique artistic voice, Ascher created expressive works on the Passion of Christ, the Last Judgment, and the figure of Bajazzo, the clown, whom he ultimately developed into his own life metaphor.

These works were complemented by Ascher's intense poems, which can be described as "unpainted pictures" and were created when the artist, persecuted by the National Socialists, had to hide in the basement of a Grunewald villa to escape deportation.

The exhibition was curated by Jutta Götzmann, Managing Director of the Freiburg Municipal Museums, and Rachel Stern, Director of the Fritz Ascher Society for Persecuted, Ostracized and Banned Art, New York.

Many exhibition tours and programs accompanied the exhibition, including Rachel Stern's lectures "Fritz Ascher in Berlin: A Search for Traces" on November 10 at Augustinermuseum Freiburg, and "Love and Betrayal. The Jewish artist Fritz Ascher (1893-1970)" on November 14 at the Jewish Museum Frankfurt.

More than 11,000 visitors saw the exhibition - a record attendance for the museum.




We celebrated the publication of our book "Welcoming the Stranger. Abrahamic Traditions and Its Contemporary Implications" with in-person book talks at Fordham University in New York and at Georgetown University in Washington, DC.

This book is a collection of thought-provoking essays exploring the theme of hospitality as a means of building bridges between different cultures and communities. This book is a must-read for anyone interested in interfaith dialogue, social justice, and creating a more inclusive society. Its contents could hardly be more relevant today.

Beginning with the story of Abraham's hospitality to the three strangers described in Genesis 18, the narrative explores both the theological evolution in and beyond the Abrahamic traditions of the principle of "welcoming the stranger," and its on-the-ground application from India to Germany in the past to America in the present.

Considered from a range of theological, cultural, legal, and political angles, the volume was discussed by its editors Ori Z Soltes, Georgetown University, and Rachel Stern, Fritz Ascher Society, New York.





VIRTUAL EXHIBITIONS

"Identity, Art and Migration" (IAM)

Responding to today's unprecedented numbers of migrants, our virtual exhibition "Identity, Art and Migration" investigates the experience of seven Jewish European artists who were forced to abandon their country of origin, or remain in hiding for years, in response to Nazi policies in effect from 1933 to 1945. These six artists: Anni Albers, Friedel Dzubas, Eva Hesse, Rudi Lesser, Lily Renée and Arthur Szyk emigrated to the United States, while one, Fritz Ascher, stayed behind in Germany, hiding in a basement for three years. These artists' lives and work address the multi-layered concept of identity and the particulars of its expression from slightly different angles. In scholarly essays, weekly virtual discussions and two virtual conferences between October 13, 2021 and January 5, 2022, and a multi-layered virtual exhibition launched in February 2022, we explored how these wrenching experiences affected their sense of who they were, and the art they made.








VIRTUAL EVENTS
